Linguistic Competencies

Word recognition skills

The goal is for this to be as automated as possible.

Transfer competence

Understand the message in one language and be able to articulate it in another.

• Discourse Competence

The ability to combine ideas into a coherent and cohesive set. This allows the interpreter to sound natural and cohesive when producing the target language.

Cognitive Flexibility

Ability to manage repetition, memory, make corrections, apply pattern recognition, comprehension, etc.

Methodological

The ability to know what tool to use given the specific interpreting situation. (Mode and vocabulary)
